Greetings from the pastor:

On September 2, I am finishing my series of sermons from John 1:19-51, which introduces the ministries of Jesus and John the Baptist. I'd like to emphasize my purpose in this series of messages and the mindset I hope we as a church will continue to cultivate.

First, First Baptist Church should be a place that fosters a growth mindset, a mindset that recognizes that we can learn new skills and sees obstacles along the way as opportunities to improve. Moving beyond our walls to participate in God's transforming work in Jackson will require us to grow at considering and ministering to the needs of our neighbors. We will make mistakes along the way, but trying, and potentially failing, is better than not trying to fulfill our mission.

Second, First Baptist Church should be a place that empowers people to use their gifts and skills to contribute to our mission. Let's focus on identifying how God is moving in someone's life so we can offer opportunities for those individuals to use their gifts in our community. Some of those gifted people who God may be calling to serve here may be your neighbors, friends or acquaintances you meet in everyday life. Let's keep our eyes open for God at work in the lives of those around us.

Third, First Baptist Church should be a place of communal experiences. My challenge to the community is to invest in mentoring at least one person. Bring someone along with you to serve, for fellowships, and for worship. When you go to serve somewhere

invite that person along. Share meals with him or her. Share how your faith motivates you to live for God. In our digital age, people are growing more alone. People can consume religious content online 24/7, including worship services, sermons, bible studies, and more. We have to offer something for people that they can't get elsewhere. We can offer our time and presence.

My final sermon of this series will speak to our hope that God can bring renewal and growth to Jackson. I'm excited about our future. I hope you are too.
